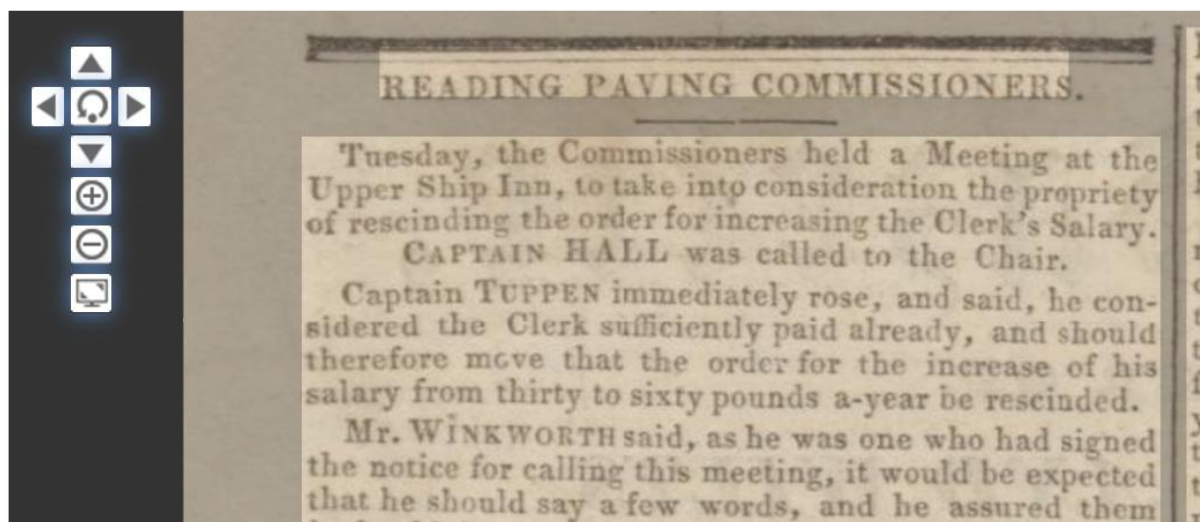
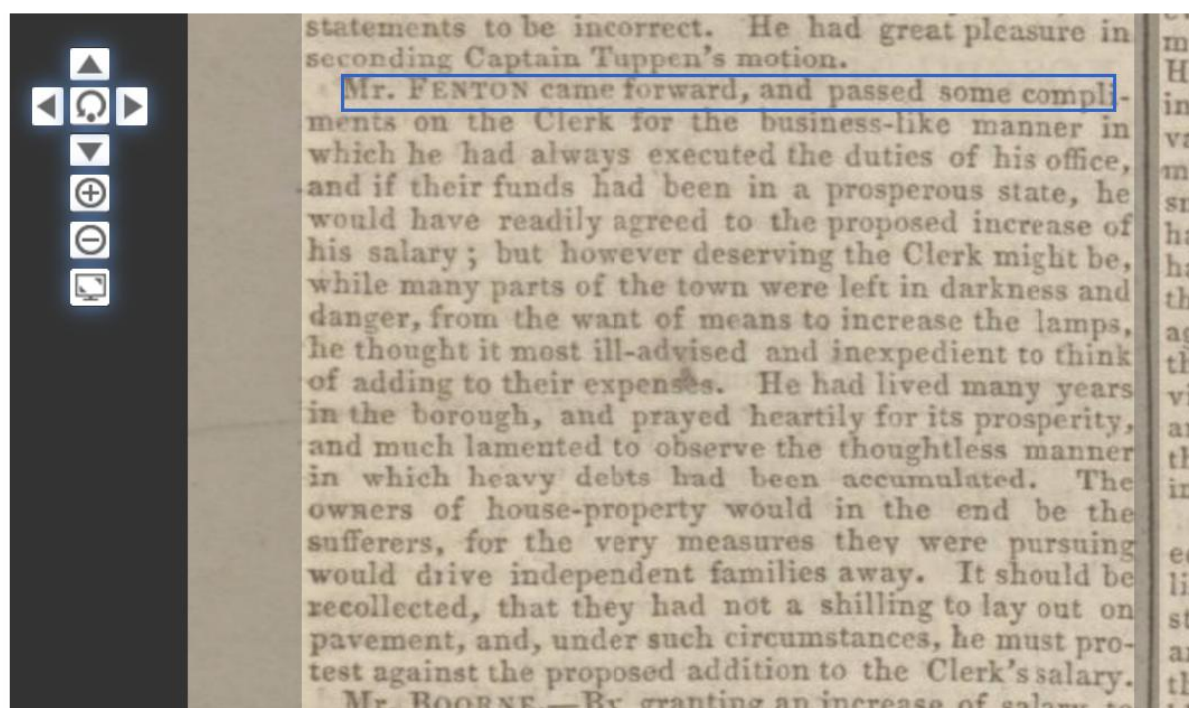

Reading Anti-Slavery Society.

At a Public Meeting, held by permission of the Mayor, at the Town-hall, Reading, on Thursday, the 21st October, 1830, The Rev. GEORGE HULME in the Chair, the following Resolutions were moved, seconded, and carried unanimously :—

First.—That, for the purpose of deriving more effectual aid from the town and neighbourhood, towards the Abolition of Slavery within the British Dominions, a Society be forthwith formed, under the following Regulations, viz. :

I.—That this Society be denominated the **READING ANTI-SLAVERY SOCIETY**.

II.—That the object of this Society be to promote the Abolition of Slavery within the British Dominions, by engaging the attention and co-operation of this town and neighbourhood, by facilitating the proper expression of public feeling, by petitioning the Houses of Parliament, and by any other measures which, from time to time, it may seem good for the Society to adopt.

III.—That the names of the members of this Society be enrolled in a book, to be kept for this purpose, beneath the following declaration, viz. :

We, whose names are under-written, do hereby declare our deep affliction at the existence of Slavery, more especially within the British Dominions, and our earnest

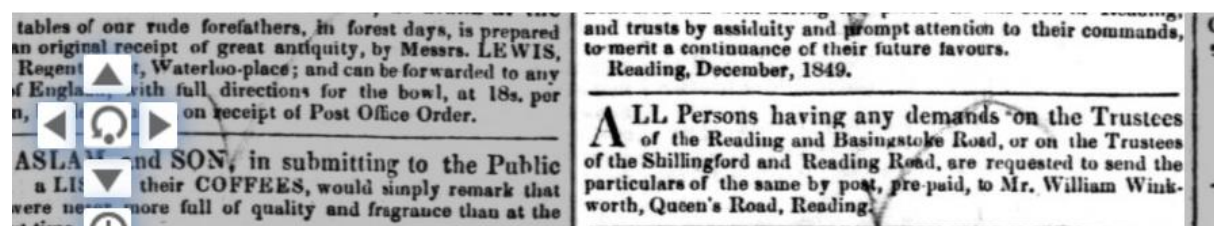
